### **Materials:**

### **OBJECTIVES**

A continuation of AVP120, students will be further introduced to the editorial process and digital storytelling through more complex workflows, advanced projects, lab assignments, lectures and viewing. The Adobe Premier Pro CC editing platform will be used in this class along with Adobe Prelude, Audition and AVID Protools. Students

will be asked to edit all assignments on Premier Pro CC software though they may utilize other tools learned such as Photoshop, Illustrator and After Effects.. Grades in this course will be determined by quizzes as well as assigned labs and projects.

## Attendance/Grading Policy

### **Assignments**

All assignments are due during the assigned class. It is the responsibility of the student to complete **all work** scheduled. Camera and Lighting Equipment will be approved only when your project/concept has been green lighted and stamped "approved". Late returns on camera and/or lighting equipment will have a negative effect on the project grade. All projects must be turned in with complete documentation and all associated paperwork. (If you need templates, you can find many forms at **dependentfilms.net**. Forms are also available in your academic advisor's office.)

#### NOTE:

All work produced in class should take into consideration the student's final video reel and portfolio. For this reason course project content should abide by the Motion Picture Association rating of PG-13. PG-13 is a sterner warning to parents, particularly when deciding which movies are not suitable for younger children. Parents, by the rating, are alerted to be very careful about the attendance of their under-teenage children. A PG-13 film is one which, in the view of the Rating Board, leaps beyond the boundaries of the PG rating in theme, violence, nudity, sensuality, language, or other contents, but does not quite fit within the restricted R category. Any drug use content will initially require at least a PG-13 rating. In effect, the PG-13 cautions parents with more stringency than usual, to give special attention to this film before they allow their 12-year-olds and younger to attend. If nudity is sexually oriented, the film will generally not be found in the PG-13 category. If violence is too rough or persistent, the film goes into the R (restricted) rating. A film's single use of one of the harsher sexually derived words, though only as an expletive, shall initially require the Rating Board to issue that film at least a PG-13 rating. More than one such expletive must lead the Rating Board to issue a film an R rating, as must even one of these words used in a sexual context.

Assignment submitted that do not follow the guidelines as stated above and/or in class will receive the work back with no grade given. If content outside of the PG-13 guidelines is necessary and/or cannot be avoided you must have instructor approval as well as a disclaimer at the beginning of the video and on the packaging.

## **Cell Phone Policy**

Your cell phone must be turned off and out of view in this class. If there is a special situation that requires you to be available by cell phone during class time you must alert the instructor prior to class and set your phone to silent/vibrate. You will be asked leave the class session and will be counted absent if this policy is ignored.
